Fellow Rotarian Lynne Belluscio presented each Rotarian with a questionnaire about how they played as a child. It is part of the Historical Societies "Let's Play" Exhibit that the Society is starting this spring. Lynne went on to discuss some history of the local playgrounds in LeRoy starting with the one behind Wolcott Street School which was believed to be the first playground.

Lynne also discussed a short history of card games in the area and mentioned that card and board games will be featured predominantly in the exhibit. The exhibit will not focus on organized activities such as Little League, etc., but will instead focus on activities that kids played in LeRoy on their own. There will also be a chance for people to take part in some of the historic games at the O-At-Ka festival this year. There will be a giant 4-square area set up on Wolcott street for people to play!
